

Few things are better than a vintage bike show, but the KC chapter of the Vintage Japanese Motorcycle Club did a good job of it by combining vintage aircraft with vintage bikes. The show was held at the Commemorative Air Force hangar at New Century Airport on August 2. There was a good size crowd there to check out the hardware and enjoy the show. I was not prepared for the massive size of "Doc" one of only two air-worthy B-29 Superfortress bombers in existence. It was reported to me that you could get a ride on Doc for a \$600 donation. I passed on that, but watched with interest as it lumbered down the runway, wondering if it would ever get up enough speed to get off the ground. When it did get airborne the pilots gave their passengers a nice long tour of the area, coming back to land about 30 minutes later. You could buy a ride in a couple of the other planes that were on display as well. I heard that a jaunt in the P-51 Mustang would set you back a few thousand, but that report was unconfirmed.

As a side note, my girlfriend, Patti is the niece of 3 of the men on the team responsible for bringing Doc back to life. Wilbur, Ervin and Donald Berger lived and worked in the Newton/Wichita area where the plane was originally built and where much of the restoration took place. They even traveled to Topeka sometimes to volunteer their labor on Doc. The old Boeing was rescued from a field in California in 1987 where it was deteriorating and had been used for target practice. Doc's first flight since 1956 was in July of 2016. The plane's interesting history can be found with a simple search. The Berger boys have since passed but Doc lives on, and their love of old iron lives on in many of us. Oh yeah, the motorcycles were pretty cool too. Nice show, KCVJMC.




































This important topic is one which is worthy of additional discussion in that the motorcycle community is aging.

As the Wauseon National Meet is AMCAs largest swap-meet, AMF was pleased to be a part of what makes this event great.



The Wauseon swap meet provides a great service to those who are restoring old motorcycles. This event caters to the older bikes more than the more modern classics.



This exacting re-creation of the Curtiss V-8 motorcycle which held the speed record for motorcycles at 136.6 mph was on display at Wauseon. The builder Dale Stoner, is without a doubt a master builder. A Seminar held in Wauseon, Ohio titled "From Garage to Heirs" covered many important topics which have become very important to our aging motorcycle community. The Seminar was held in mid July 18th at the National Meet in Wauseon, Ohio. The Wauseon event is one of the largest AMCA (Antique Motorcycle Club of America) swap meets in the country.

As the motorcycle community is aging, it is becoming more common for collectors to begin selling off either a part of their collections or all of them. In a few cases, the owner may pass away before the liquidation has occurred, leaving the machines to his wife or heirs. When this occurs, his wife or family may not know the value of his collection and may also not know where the titles might even be. Here are some of the important issues which need to be resolved:

- Are there clear titles allowing the motorcycles to be legally sold? How can the heirs know if the titles are complete, allowing the machines to be sold!
- Where can accurate values be found? Ultimately, the value is what a buyer will pay. What is the best way to come to determine this figure?
- What are the **best ways to market** and sell vintage or collectable motorcycles? What expenses can a seller expect to pay, depending on the marketing program which is used?
- With so many scams, how can a seller stay clear of dishonest buyers or dealers? How can the money and titles be exchanged securely?
- How can you **build trust** with an individual or marketing company to insure that the sale of machines will be hastle free?
- How can machines be shipped and what would the general cost be?

These are just a few of the major issues which must be confronted by the individual who has inherited valuable vehicles of any type. In many cases there will be a car, truck, motorcycles, or just valuable parts involved. As an individual who has discussed these matters with many people over the years, typically widows, deciding what to do can be daunting. Other issues include moving ahead while grieving, dealing with family disputes, insuring that you are working with people who can be trusted, and even seemingly simple issues like how money can be safely collected or transferred once something has been sold. Many situations can cause distress. This topic is a large one with many different avenues to consider, which may be discussed at future events of this type.

The "Garage To Heirs" seminar answered many of these questions and many more. Because of the relevance of this topic at this time, the AMF (Antique Motorcycle Foundation) is considering continuing this series in the future. There was a video made of the July presentation and after it has been edited, it will be made available to the public on the AMF website – https://www.amf.foundation.

The Wauseon National Meet is made possible by five AMCA Chapters and was attended by many current AMCA members. These include the Lake Erie Chapter, the Maumee Valley Chapter, the Ohio Valley Chapter, the River Valley Chapter, and the Wolverine Chapter. Our thanks go out to those who do the work so that this event and others like it, can serve our motorcycle community.




Santa Fe Trail Motorcycle Club Auguest 2025 meeting presentation: Jim Lepisto

Motor Maids was established in San Francisco in 1940 and was one of the first women's motorcycle groups created and is the oldest still existing in the United States.
